Entering 12th Grade 2025-2026 Summer Reading Instructions:

STEP ONE: CHOOSE A BOOK TO READ

Purchase and read one of the following novels this summer...

- The Hobbit by J.R.R. Tolkien
- The Picture of Dorian Grey by Oscar Wilde
- White Teeth by Zadie Smith

STEP TWO: READING JOURNAL

- Keep a digital reading journal that tracks your reading. Each entry should include the following...
 - o The date
 - o The pages read
 - o a brief summary of the events
 - CLICKS, CLUNKS and CLARITY (clicks are "aha!" moments from the text-things that are surprising, interesting, or left an impression; clunks are
 confusing moments, or questions that you have; clarity is when a clunk turns
 into a click-- either the book answers the question, or you figured it out
 yourself!)
 - For the digital journal, the brief summary and "clicks, clunks, and clarity" notes do not have to be written in full sentences. Bullet points are fine.

STEP THREE: DISCUSSION

You will participate in a book club discussion at the beginning of the school year with a member of the faculty or staff. Students are expected to fully and articulately participate in the discussion (see the rubric below). If a student doesn't meaningfully or fully participate in the discussion, they will be assigned an alternative assignment to complete for credit.
